# **Safety Tips**

### Slush Safety

There is an unusual amount of slush insulated by the snow on the lakes this winter. Having your snowmobile getting stuck in this slush can be dangerous and you may find yourself stuck. There have been a number of riders getting stuck this year.

Here are some tips:

- Avoid sledding alone, always travel with someone.
- If you encounter slush, DON'T STOP! Increase throttle so that you don't sink into the slush and you stay on top of the slush.
- How do you know you've encountered slush? Riders describe encountering slush as, "your sled begins to bog down and feels like you are breaking through the ice".
- How can you avoid the slush? You will typically see discolored snow which may indicate slush, but with the large amount of snow this makes it difficult to see.
- Pay attention to other snowmobile tracks, you may be able to see slush.

### **Public Works**

#### **Snow Removal**

In order to properly remove snow from Town streets and provide adequate driving lanes we kindly ask residents to:

- NOT shovel snow from their driveways/sidewalks into the street
- Refrain from placing garbage containers on the street for extended periods of time before or after pick up
- Remove vehicles from streets where snow removal is scheduled
- Please be patient and take your time when encountering our snow removal equipment
